

The staff and residents have squash and tomatoes growing in the new spring planter. The squash is planted a bit close, but we can fix that in the next couple of weeks. The planter that was planted out in the fall has a few things like collards that overwintered and black seeded Simpson lettuce popping up. The collards are not doing much as the courtyard gets too much shade. Wanda continues to work with them to learn about what grows well with less sun.

After weeding the planters and taking pictures, Wanda and LaBrittany talked about doing gardening activities with the residents. If anyone is interested in presenting a topic like herbs, veggies that will grow in less sun, or container gardening (they can add containers out there and some are available in the Sprout to Share Seed Library to use). ### **Member in the Spotlight**

### **ErnaLYN Wienken BUESCHER**



Lyn has an April birthday. There are two official flowers designated to the month of April – the Daisy and the Sweet Pea. While the simple daisy is more popular out in the fields, a wonderful bouquet of bright gerbera daisies is gorgeous in a vase. The sweet pea is beautifully delicate and has a sweet fragrance that can freshen any room.

Inspired by both her parents, Lyn developed a love and appreciation of plants early in life.

Being raised on a small farm in Shaw's Bend, garden crops (corn, cotton, potatoes, watermelons, tomatoes, strawberries, peaches, figs, plums, etc.) were grown for food, as well as for economic reasons. She and her brother were crucial in helping with the raising and harvesting of these crops.

Closer to and surrounding the house were a large variety of flowering plants that were planted and enjoyed due to the aesthetic beauty they provided. She was delighted when the roses, irises, lilies, gardenias, azaleas, chrysanthemums, periwinkles, hydrangeas, gladiolas, magnolias, etc. were in bloom. She enjoyed having a jar filled with some fresh cut flowers on the dining table and to this day continues to bring floral clippings into her home so she can enjoy their beauty throughout the day. Her mother was amazing when growing plants was the topic. There was no lawn of grass around the home, only pathways through all of the flowers. Not only did neighbors and people from town often rely on her to grow flowers for the floral arrangements found in churches on Sunday mornings but also for any kind of gathering – weddings, birthdays, family reunions, holidays, etc.

She most certainly had a 'green thumb' as she could take a 'barren looking' twig and have it grow into an amazing plant. Lyn certainly had a great foundation and from there developed her love of plants which was instilled by both of her parents.

When the fields and road sides were filled with bluebonnets, Indian paintbrush, phlox, Indian blankets, buttercups, and many other wildflowers, she thoroughly enjoyed the colorful array. In the spring, she created traditional Easter 'nests' made from a base layer of tree moss which was then adorned with wildflowers. The Easter nests were assembled and left on the front porch the day before Easter. Then on Easter Sunday morning, they were magically filled with colorful boiled eggs. This is a very old German tradition that was continued with her children and her nephews/nieces. Cedar trees were plentiful on the farm and provided the yearly Christmas tree along with a wonderful fir scent which radiated throughout the home.

After marriage, she and her husband Bennett bought their first home in the Robindell subdivision in Houston where she quickly joined the Robindell Garden Club and was a member from the mid-1950s to the early 1960s. Meetings were rotated and held in the homes of the members. She thrived as she was introduced to a vast array of information. Her interest was piqued as she enjoyed learning different techniques in flower arranging. Creativity surfaced as she entered many flower shows which had numerous local entries.

After a move to their second home in the Briargrove Park subdivision on the west side of Houston, she helped to organize and establish the Rustic Oaks Garden Club. Once again, meetings were held in the homes of the members. Floral arranging for many flower shows was always an enjoyment for her.

One of her special remembrances was when she earned the highest score and was presented with the top tri-color award for her Hogarth design entry. At this show there were 4 design categories: circle, square, triangle, and Hogarth. The theme of this particular flower show was songs. Lyn chose the song Greensleeves. Not having any green flowers needed for her design, she created the flowers from geranium leaves. Abelia was used as the basis or foundation for the curved design line for the Hogarth. A green ceramic pitcher was used to support her creation. After moving back to her hometown of Columbus, Lyn soon joined the Columbus Garden Club in the early 1980s. At that time, meetings were held in the various homes of the members. Later meetings began to be held in church fellowship areas. Over the years she has been honored to serve on many different committees, act as President (2 years) and later as Vice-President (8 years) of the Columbus Garden Club. She continues to enjoy the focus of the CGC along with the camaraderie of the members.

Yes, Lyn has a love and appreciation of plants, especially those which produce fruits/vegetables and those which produce flowers of beauty. Lyn's favorite list of flowers probably has the rose at the top. Without a doubt Lyn's favorite garden insect is the butterfly which is shared by her sister Ellen. Lyn has several clothing butterfly pins which she proudly wears. Pinks, blues, and purples are at the top of her favorite color palette when referring to flowers. That said, Lyn has always said that a flower's beauty is always enhanced when it is surrounded by textured greenery with the hint of delicate fillers.

All CGC attendees attended the Executive Committee/Full Board Meeting where planning and committee reporting was conducted. Since all CGC attendees were part of the




