

Member in the Spotlight – SHARON HEIMANN

This is Sharon's story.

I was raised in central Texas in a small community called Ben Hur. My Grandmother taught me how to sew on a Singer treadle machine. For years I made my own clothes or altered clothes that were given to me. I took home economics all my years in high school and then on a rainy day in January my senior year I was called to the principal's office while in English class. As I walked down the aisle my friends were asking me what I had done wrong to be called to the office and I had no idea. When I got there I was introduced to a representative from Mary Harden Baylor College who offered me a full academic/work scholarship. Mary Harden Baylor was a girl's school at that time and there were many times during my four years that I needed something and extra funds would show up in my account. God seemed to be looking out for me.

I started out with a major in home economics but I just could not get past the cooking so I changed to Health and Physical Education. I graduated in 1966, coached and taught school for 38 years. During that time I married my wonderful husband of 57 years and I went with him to Virginia and Quam while he was in the Navy and taught in both places but I yearned to get back to Texas. I never quit sewing and eventually even made my hudband's leisure suits that he wore as a farm equipment sales representative.

In early 2000 I met my new neighbors who introduced me to the International Quilt Show. Quilting was something I was familiar with because my grandmother and her friends and my husband's grandmother quilted all the time but mostly hand quilting. Through my friendship with a special lady from Oklahoma I decided I wanted to make one quilt after I retired but another special lady offered me a chance to learn a newer more technical way of quilting. So in 2007 I made my first quilt using a Gammill quilting machine. Judy Park was my first quilting teacher and that first quilt was made for the Columbus Garden Club Scholarship Raffle at the request of Lynda Counts. The quilt won Best of Section in the Colorado County Fair and in December was won by Ann Moore.

Quilting has become a therapy for me. It has helped me to make wonderful new friends and given me inspiration in times of stress and keeps me active. It also serves as a way to help others through scholarships or ministry quilts or quilts of valor. God has blessed me with a talent that I hope to use in the ways He gives me for as long as He needs. God bless each of you for what you give to this community.

Columbus Oaks Raised Bed Planter Project

The planter still needs some repairs on the one that had rotten boards. Wanda Anglin will work with them over the next week or two to get that finished and to get the soil picked up from Take Root that the garden club bought for them. We will have them ready for a spring garden planting. Here is a picture of broccoli that is starting to produce and the other of the rest of the garden that includes black seeded, Simpson, lettuce, and carrots.



Also quite a bit of low growing weeds that I gave them information on which was weeded so they could pull them. The residents have greatly enjoyed the planter that we provided seeds

from Sprout to Share Seed Library. And a resident bought some collard and broccoli transplants they've been harvesting things along and really enjoying it.

Flowers for Night Pollinators


Night pollinators like most pollinators love a variety of plants to choose from. Most night pollinators are attracted to many types of flowers as well as native plants and grasses with flowers that are shades of white, cream, silver, pale pink or pale lavender.

Examples of flowers that can draw night pollinators to your garden are yucca, moonflower which is a climber, angel's trumpets, night blooming water lilies, night blooming jasmine. Heavily fragrant flowers are also very attractive to our night pollinators for example; four o'clocks which have several colors but has a sweet lemony scent that hummingbird hawk moths love, phlox (white), tuberose (white), wisteria has strong scent at night, dianthus has a sweet clove fragrance, lilies with their scent becoming stronger at night, lilacs which has a honey-sweet fragrance, and gardenias. Other choices are flowers that glow, due to the moon light, at night for example cosmos (white), Zinnias (white), Yarrow (white), and flowers or grasses with silvery, gray and variegated foliage.

So, as you plan your gardens for the spring be creative and plant flowers not just for your day pollinators but a moon garden for the night pollinators! Make sure you group the night pollinator flowers that are white, have pleasing strong smells, and glow together so they are easily found by our night friends.

Can Youth in the Garden Help Your Project?

Bren Wyman and Wanda Anglin invite you to consider if our Youth in the Garden student volunteers can help with your project. We have discussed having the Youth in the Garden to water the Courthouse Square planters in December and January on Tuesdays.



Several of our members have expressed interest in Columbus Garden Club participating in the Career Fair, January 23, sponsored jointly by Columbus Chamber of Commerce and Columbus Independent School District.

Wanda Anglin says, "I know it may feel like a bit of a stretch that the garden club is part of a career day, but the goal is to expose kids to many different ideas so they have passions to pursue. In my Master Naturalist work, I have come across several people who went to a bird walk, or saw reptiles at a zoo, or talked to a person who had a passion for a topic, and they have a career in that field because of that one experience." Wanda, Regena Williamson, and Sharon Wegenhoft are interested in working on this project. Wanda has contacted Becky Nutt at the Chamber to get info of how the career fair will run, how many students will be involved, and our need to do something to attract attention to our table. There will be 3 groups of 9/10, 11th, and 12th grades with an estimate of about 100 per group. Our club is considering 3 handouts/topics that include: Environmental Sciences Careers; Horticultural Sciences Careers (Floral Design, Greenhouse/Nursery, Landscape Mgt.); and Garden Club Support of Student Careers.

This sounds like an exciting opportunity.




